

Defibrillator Awareness





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You need an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) to deliver a shock to a casualty who is in cardiac arrest. You can use an AED on your own or with a helper. But there are many different types of defibrillators, and you may not know which is best for your workplace. In this course we introduce the different types of defibrillators to help you select the most appropriate for your organisation.

(CPR is different for adults, children and infants, and our guidance has been updated to reflect changes due to COVID-19.)

Who is this training for?

This course is for any person or organisation in the UK that:

- Doesn't have a defibrillator within a minute's reach.
- Doesn't know how to operate a defibrillator in the event of someone going into cardiac arrest.

What does the course cover?

- How to service a defibrillator.
